# About the Norwin Band Program

The Norwin Band was formed in the 1923-24 school year. In that first year, director Steven Winter remarked, "an organization, such as our Norwin Band turned out to be, is one that will make our high school known throughout the state." After nearly 100 years we remain committed to serving our students and community, and making music at the highest possible level.

Currently, the Norwin Band Program is under the direction of Mr. Tim Daniels, with assistance from Mr. Brandon Kandrack. The high school band and colorguard programs include around 150 students annually. Ensembles at Norwin High School currently include the Wind Ensemble, Concert Band, Jazz Band, Marching Band, Percussion Ensemble, and various small ensembles. The Band department also supports a robust indoor colorguard program including the Norwin World Guard, a 7-time WGI World Class Finalist. The band program retains a large supplemental instructional staff who not only work with the marching band, but also teach privately through our after-school private lesson program. The Norwin Percussion Ensemble has been invited to perform numerous times at the PMEA State Conference, as well as the MENC All-East Conference in 2011. The Wind Ensemble has performed at the 2017 NAfME Eastern Division Conference, as well as the 2020 Youngstown State University Wind and Percussion Invitational. Both the Wind Ensemble and Concert Band receive consistent Superior rating at PMEA Music Performance Assessments. The music department at Norwin also offers multiple choirs and orchestras, as well as AP Music Theory, Fundamentals of Guitar, and three levels of Music Technology.

The staff and students continue to strive for excellence in performance and citizenship. We continue to work to honor our past, and move forward to even greater levels of achievement. # Norwin Band Staff

*Mr. Tim Daniels* has been the Director of Bands at Norwin High School since 2013. His duties include directing the Marching Band, Wind Ensemble, Jazz Ensemble as well as teaching AP Music Theory and Music Technology classes. During his tenure, the Marching Band has been named a Bands of America Regional Champion, PIMBA Champion, USBands Class VI Open National Champion, and was the 2021 Bands of America Grand National Class 2A Champion. Under his direction, the Norwin Wind Ensemble receives consistent Superior ratings at PMEA Music Performance Assessment and has performed at the 2017 NAfME Eastern Division Conference, 2020 Youngstown State University Wind and Percussion Invitational, and the 2023 PMEA State Conference.

Prior to joining the staff at Norwin, Tim served as a Band Director in the Arlington School District in LaGrangeville, NY where he directed 9th Grade Band, Jazz Band and assisted with the marching band. Tim has also served in various capacities on the band staffs of the Fox Chapel, Gateway and Penn-Trafford marching bands. In addition to this experience, Mr. Daniels spent the summer of 2009 marching with the Bluecoats Drum and Bugle Corps.

Mr. Daniels received his B.M. in Music Education, trumpet applied, from Youngstown State University. His primary teachers include Dr. Stephen L. Gage, Dr. Brandt Payne, Dr. Christopher Krummel and Dr. Kent Englehardt. He holds a Masters Degree in Music Education from Duquesne University and is currently pursuing a Ph. D in Music Education at Kent State University. Active as a researcher, Mr. Daniels recently presented original research at the 2021 NAfME Eastern Division Conference.

A native of North Huntingdon, PA, Tim graduated from Norwin High School in 2008. Mr. Daniels is active as an adjudicator, mainly for USBands, throughout the country. In addition to his responsibilities at Norwin, Tim enjoys performing and plays as a freelance trumpeter in the Pittsburgh Area and performs with the Westmoreland Symphonic Winds in Greensburg, PA.

*Mr. Brandon Kandrack* is in his seventh year as Assistant Band Director and Percussion Specialist at Norwin High School and Norwin Middle School. His responsibilities include directing the Concert Band and Percussion Ensemble, serving as Assistant Marching Band Director, and teaching music technology courses at Norwin High School. He also teaches 7th and 8th grade percussion classes at Norwin Middle School and serves as the K-12 Music Department Curriculum Leader for the Norwin School District.

A native of Monroeville, PA, Mr. Kandrack is a graduate of Kent State University, where he received his master's degree in music education. He completed his undergraduate studies in music education and educational psychology at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. While at IUP, he studied percussion with Dr. Michael Kingan, conducting with Dr. Jack Stamp, and piano with Dr. Henry Wong Doe.

Prior to joining the music department at Norwin, Mr. Kandrack taught music in the Franklin Regional School District. He served for several years as the Front Ensemble Coordinator with the Gateway High School Marching Band and Co-Director of their indoor drumline. Mr. Kandrack also instructed the marching band, percussion ensemble, intermediate school percussion ensemble, and winter percussion ensemble at Kiski Area High School and was the Assistant Director of the Cavalier Percussion Group.

Mr. Kandrack currently maintains an active studio of private students and freelances around the Pittsburgh area. He is also a member of several professional organizations, including NAfME, PMEA, WCMEA, and the Percussive Arts Society, where he serves as the Secretary of the Pennsylvania chapter.

# Program Notes

*A Festival Prelude (1962)* was written in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the Tri-State Music Festival, held annually in Enid, OK. It was given its first performance on that occasion by the Philips University Concert Band, to whom it was dedicated, with the composer conducting. While still in manuscript, it was widely performed throughout the country, and has come to be regarded as one of the composer's most brilliant and powerful works for the modern concert band.

My Soul to Keep (2019) was premiered by the Auburn University Wind Ensemble, and is dedicated to all those affected by gun violence. The composer writes, Gun Violence has become a plague in America. Mass shootings and deaths by guns in this country have become commonplace. As musicians, besides voting, music can be our loudest, strongest voice. Music can help us remember those we have lost and those who are forever impacted. Music is a bridge across all ethnic, social, racial & religious divides. Music can heal. Music can help bring about the changes we so desperately need. The time for change is now.

*Caccia and Chorale (1975)* was composed at the end of Williams' life. Caccia and Chorale is a two-part work commissioned by his good friend and Director of Bands at the University of Wisconsin (Stevens Point), Donald E. Green. Just before Williams began writing the work, he was diagnosed with cancer. Afraid that he wouldn't survive surgery to remove the cancer, he composed only a caccia, an Italian term meaning "hunt" or "chase." It was his motive to expose the materialism of the world, and he uses a driving snare drum rhythm throughout much of the section to represent this pursuit. After surviving the operation, he composed the chorale as not only a prayer of thanks, but it is also a political message to urge humankind to return to religious or ethical behavior. It is a simple, but gorgeous representation of humankind, signified by a heartbeat-like motif in the low winds and percussion and luscious dissonances and harmonies throughout. Williams passed away not long after the work's completion, but it has withstood the test of time if for no other reason than its emotional connections with audiences. It is Clifton Williams' 100th birthday in 2023.

Steampunk Suite (2016) attempts to depict various scenes that take place in a fictional alternate history that features notable people alive in the Victorian era including Charles Ives, Marie Curie, H.G. Wells, Jules Verne, P.T. Barnum and Nikola Tesla. It borrows from popular music of the era, including cakewalk, march, waltz, and the song "Daisy Bell." These are combined with sounds of clockwork and imagined steam technology. It also borrows various musical elements from numerous composers of the time including Ives, Sousa, Satie, Karl King, Stravinsky, and Weill, with some Khachaturian and Danny Elfman thrown in for good measure. The piece has been transcribed for wind ensemble from the original chamber work, *Steampunk Scenes* by the composer. *-Erika Svanoe* 

*Children's March (1933)* is dedicated "To my little friend, Diane Keedwell, and all the other children in the world," and has the subtitle "On songs the youngsters sing." This medley march includes excerpts from the songs "Mary had a little lamb," "Jingle bells," "Sing a song of sixpence," "The farmer in the dell," "Lazy Mary, will you get up?," "Hickory dickory dock," "Rock-a-bye baby," "Pop! Goes the weasel," and "London bridge is falling down." *-Edwin Franko Goldman*
